Convallaria majalis

(lily of the valley, May lily)

May lily is a sweetly scented perennial that is highly poisonous with green leaves that turn yellow in the winter and white or pink flowers that attract bees. The apparently single-stemmed plants are frequently connected together by an extensive rhizome (horizontal underground stems) system to form huge, long-lived colonies. As a cut flower, lily-of-the-valley has a very short shelf life, and so is usually purchased from wholesalers with the roots still attached.

'Albostriata' has white-striped leaves. 'Rosea' has pink flowers.
